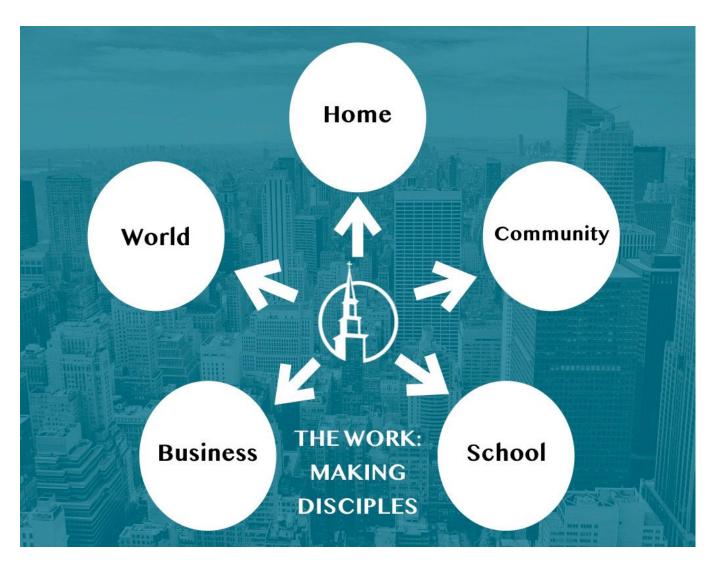
Application:

Think of a number to yourself: On a scale of 0-10, how often do you think about the spiritual condition of the people you know? (0= never, 10=constantly)

Most of us are going to feel somewhat convicted this week. Our burden for the lost isn't what it should be. But don't lose heart. Addressing the obstacles sets us up for success! The purpose of our time together is not only to discover truth together, but also for these lessons to be very practical in encouraging and equipping you. Being used by God is fun! Sharing Christ and seeing people believe will bring God joy and us joy!

The best way we can live this out in Week 1 is to begin identifying the people in our lives who need Jesus.

On the back page, devote a few minutes to personally write down names of specific people within your "Circles of Life" (friends, family, relatives, co-workers, classmates, acquaintances, neighbors, etc.) Once finished, pray over your list.
